Executive summary

This Resilience Fund application is to develop a stock of digital images and videos that can be used when engaging with the public on individual preparedness and community resilience. The videos and images will be real life case studies of the things people involved in the earthquakes did that helped them survive the disaster. The content will be base around themes such as preparing for a disaster, vulnerable groups such as disability and CALD communities, and "how to" instructional videos. Each item, video or image, will be designed to communicate one key CDEM message, thus they will be short and to the point.

This stock of digital content will form a digital library to be used by the entire CDEM sector for public education programmes, especially those that use social media as the mechanism for connecting to the public. The content can also be used in presentations and printed material and will be invaluable in raising the profile of the CDEM message in the community.

This project will be invaluable in addressing a gap in our ability to reach the public, will benefit the whole sector and is cost effective in its approach.

Problem/opportunity

In purely public education terms the Canterbury Earthquakes are a relevant and poignant real life case study of what happens to New Zealanders in a disaster. Thousands of images and stories of people and buildings have been produced with which CDEM personnel can use to illustrate their message when engaging with the public. Despite this very little digital information has been produced that is directly relevant to the preparedness and resilience messaging that CDEM needs to promote.

We know that personal stories are a compelling method for motivating people to take action to prepare, especially when the audience can relate to the story teller as a normal kiwi, and not "an expert" or someone from a different country. Questions such as "What advice would you give someone about preparing for a disaster" and "what was your plan, how did it work" are simple stories that we can gather in the form of videos and images to use to promote the CDEM message.

There is a time limit on our ability to collect this data, we are now two years out from the quakes and these stories will soon fade from people's memories.

Alignment with identified goals and objectives

This project will tangibly increase the sectors ability to achieve goal one of the national

strategy – Increasing community awareness, understanding preparedness and participation in CDEM through the establishment of a digital "library" of material to draw from in developing public education programmes.

It also addresses a major gap in our capability to engage through social media due to the lack of good quality learning content as it costly and time intensive to develop this for each individual campaign. Developing "stock" material in this way is more cost effective and will help fill this gap for the entire sector.

Dissemination of benefits to sector

The data for this project will be collected digitally – in the form of video and photos, and will be available to the entire CDEM sector for use in their public education work. Open source databases such as You Tube and UC CEISMIC – www.ceismic.org.nz will enable the data to be accessed freely by anybody wishing to use it.

On receiving the Resilience Fund grant the Canterbury Group will write to all other CDEM Groups about the project to inform them that the project is going ahead and develop content in consultation with these groups.
